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Jonathan Carroll, a graduate of Maynooth University with a Double Honour's Bachelor's Degree in Civil Law, and a Master's Degree in Military History and Strategic Studies, is currently a PhD student in Military History at Texas A&M University. Jonathan's research focus is on military operations other than war (MOOTW). He is currently working on a project examining the multinational military interventions in Somalia from 1992-1995. Previously, Jonathan was an occasional lecturer with the Centre for Military History and Strategic Studies at Maynooth University, providing academic instruction to Defence Forces officer cadets, potential-officer, and officer progression career courses. Jonathan also served in the Irish Army Reserve as an NCO, and subsequently a commissioned officer, with units in Dublin, Athlone and the Defence Forces Training Centre

James (Jim) Deery hails from Dublin and is currently studying for a PhD through the Centre for Military History and Strategic Studies in Maynooth University. His area of research is Ireland and the Napoleonic Wars with specific reference to Irish soldiers in Wellington's armies 1808 – 1815.
